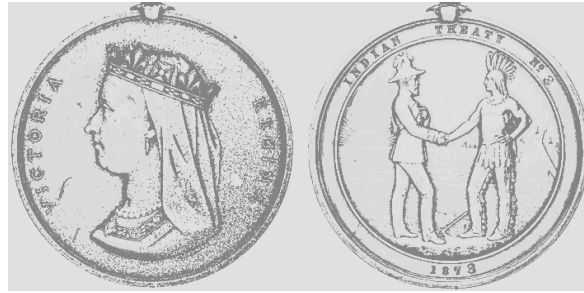


Walking the Path to Reconciliation



Treaty Relations, Resource Sharing and Reconciliation A 6-week Course for Learning and Action

This 6-session course will invite participants to explore the following issues:

- The numbered treaties: Missed opportunity for an honourable Settler-Indigenous relationship
- Economic analysis: How has 'settler colonialism' shaped the local economies of First Nations communities in Manitoba?
- Case study: Manitoba Hydro development and impacts on Indigenous communities.
- The Treaty relationship: Can the spirit and intent of Treaties provide a foundation for social and economic reconciliation that is ethical, honourable and practical?
- Case study: Restoring Indigenous Community Economies; from social assistance to social investment - food, energy and livelihoods
- Action agenda: What can we do as non-Indigenous and Indigenous peoples to decolonize our relationship?

Facilitators: **Robert Miller** has worked for over 25 years doing community economic and social development in First Nations in northern Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario. **Ellen Cook** from Grand Rapids, Manitoba is a retired educator, Cree language teacher, and co-chair of the Interchurch Council on Hydropower.
